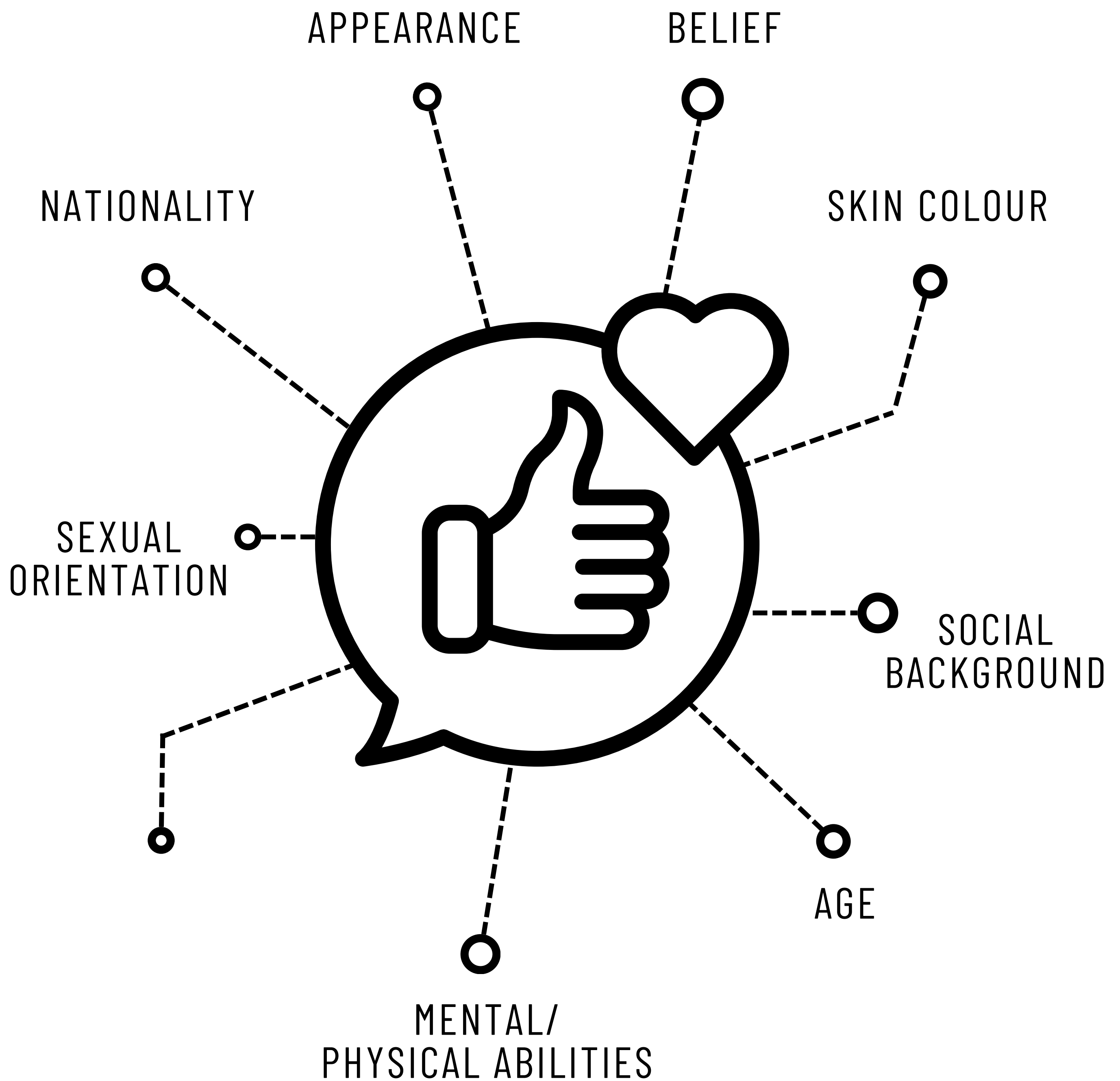

‘All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights.’ Our democracy is based on the first article of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. This poster stands as a symbol of welcoming culture, diversity, and the right to equal treatment.

The poster can be used in schools, in adult education (e.g., language classes), in non-formal education (e.g., youth centres, maison relais, etc.), as well as in public institutions.

How it works:

Option 1: Visualising culture of welcome

Hang the poster in the classroom, group, or reception area (e.g., in public institutions) as a symbol of welcome. Use it as a starting point when establishing discussion or classroom rules, and as a reference when dealing with contemptuous remarks.

Option 2 : Activity with sticky notes

First, ask the group to individually answer the following question: ‘When do you feel welcome in a group or in class?’ Then discuss together what it means to ‘feel welcome.’ Everyone writes or draws their answer anonymously and sticks it onto the poster. Also remember to ask if everybody understands the terminology and to clarify if needed.

Finally, discuss the responses: ‘What did surprise you?’ and ‘What can you put into practice in your daily life?’
